ISSA: Stays Strong

June, 2022

The 2021 – 2022 season has been very exciting. The number of schools has increased by 10 % over the pre-covid years. We are now 626 High School teams spread between 7 districts. The largest district is now the Mid-Atlantic Sailing Association (MAISA) with 141 Schools over taking the Mid West district (MISSA). We continue to run over 400 regattas throughout the calendar school year. With help of many Yacht Clubs, Community Sailing Centers and various volunteer organizations.



The Cressy Championships (single handed) was sailed in Key Biscayne, Miami in Lasers and Laser radial rigs. A total of 36 sailors competed in the Cressy with Guthrie Braun from St. Petersburg HS winning the ILCA 7 and Robby Meek from Severn School winning the ILCA 6. The regatta was hosted by Lauderdale Yacht Club using the state park facilities in Key Biscayne. The format was a little different from previous years with 10 boats provided by Zim Sailing and West Coast Sailing and the balance of boats brought by the sailors. Many thanks to Lauderdale YC and the volunteers to create a very successful championship event.

In October 2021, The National Invitational Girls Championship was hosted by Mission Bay Yacht Club with Point Loma HS defeating 20 schools. In December 2021, The National Invitational Keelboat Championship was hosted by St. Petersburg YC with Lake Travis HS defeating nine other schools winning the Mendelblatt Trophy.

The Baker Trophy was raced in Seabrook, Texas in CFJ's. We had great sailing on Saturday completing 66 races but we only finished 6 raced in the gold fleet due to poor weather conditions. Immacalata La Salle High School from Miami defeated 11 other schools in the 3x3 team racing format.

The Mallory Trophy was held in Mission Bay, San Diego in perfect conditions. Mission Bay Yacht Club ran a great regatta completing 40 races in 2 fleets. Mater Dei High School totally dominated the fleet winning by 80 points. The organization for this regatta was fantastic with boats provided by all the local yacht clubs and new sails from the Pacific Coast District. ISSA is very fortunate to have such great volunteers helping us provide quality racing.


The ISSA board is looking into providing more quality sailing for the 626 high schools teams in the future including more regional and all girl events.

Mallory Trophy-

Fleet Racing Championship

The Mallory Trophy is school sailing's oldest trophy, first sailed in 1930. It was selected and presented to the IYRA (now ISSA) by Clifford Malloyr and his son. The early competitios were in Atlantic-class sloops, hence the serling silver model of the original Atlantic on the trophy. In recent years the competition for the ISSA Nationals has been in doubhehanded dinghies in a two-division format.

The 2022 ISSA Fleet Race National Championship (Mallory Trophy) was hosted by Mission Bay Yacht Club in San Diego, California. Thank you to our PROs Doug Hart & Jimmer Montgomery, Regatta Chair Chris Wright, PCISA Executive Director Michael Segerblom and the many volunteers who donated their time to help with the running of the regatta.

Saturday began with overcast skies, moderate temperatures, and a variable WSW breeze averaging about 7 knots. All teams were present and accounted for. There were no change of boat rotations. Winds were up and down throughout the day, with changes in weather (some sprinkling of rain). Later in the day, the wind shifted further north to a steady W breeze. Winds ranged from 7 to 15 knots. Racing continued until 6:00pm on Saturday completing 26 races, 13 for each division.

Sunday provided warmer temperatures in the mid 60s and clear, sunny skies. At the scheduled first warning, the wind was about 9 knots and steadily WSW. The race committee started racing on time at 11am. The wind was steady at 9 knots and a WSW for the day of racing. Race committee completed a total of 14 races on Sunday, 7 in each fleet. The total races completed over the weekend was 40; 20 in each fleet. Racing finished up around 2:45pm followed by a trophy presentation.

Mater Dei High School took home first place, followed by Severn School in second place, and Immaculata La Salle High School in third. Congratulations to all sailors that made it to the 2022 ISSA Fleet Race National Championships!

Thank you to our PROs Doug Hart & Jimmer Montgomery, Regatta Chair Chris Wright, PCISA Executive Director Michael Segerblom and the many volunteers who donated their time to help with the running of the regatta.

Baker Trophy

Team Racing Championship

In 1990 the Board of Directors established the ISSA national Team Racing Championship for the Baker Trophy, named for Toby Baker. Tabor Academy's then long-time head sailing coach. In recognition of his commitment to high school sailing and to team racing in particular. Toby served as President and Treasurer of ISSA and as President of the New England School Sailing Association (NESSA). His influence helped interscholastic sailing evolve into a national organization.

Day I of the 2022 ISSA Baker Team Race National Championship saw near perfect team race conditions on Clear Lake. With racing right off the Lakewood Yacht Club jetty, the I2 teams rotated quickly through 24 boats to keep the races moving.

Racing began at 10:00 am, and a full rotation of 66 races was completed by 5:30 pm. A steady east to southeast breeze at 6-10 kts held for most of the day. A late afternoon shift to the left, and a course reset, briefly interrupted the final races of the day.

At the end of day I, the Royal Lions of Immaculata La Salle High School stand in first place with the Severn School Admirals in in second and the Mater Dei High School Monarchs in third.

Sunday started with a postponement due to storms. Racing got under way about 11:00 am with sunny skies & temps in the 80's, but light winds. After a wind shift and a course reset, racing got under way for the Gold, Silver & Bronze divisions. The wind fluctuated between 5 to 10 knots throughout the day, with a second wind shift and course reset later in the afternoon.

Gold fleet was able to complete I round, however the Silver & Bronze rounds were not able to finish due to another wind shift, a decrease in breeze and the time limit of 3PM.

Immaculata La Salle - SAISA won the overall with a 12/2 record, followed closely by Mater Dei - PCISA scoring 11/3 and third is The Severn School - MASSA with a 10/4 record.

Thank you to all of the many, many volunteers and organizers who helped with this regatta, and the hosts Lakewood Yacht Club and Bay Access Organization. Special thanks to all of the umpires as they worked especially hard as we lost almost half of our scheduled umpire team just before the regatta due to covid. They did a great job of taking the time to explain calls or non-calls and discuss with the competitors how and why calls were made.

Annual Report 2022

Cressy Trophy

Morton Starr Cressy, Jr. was a 1927 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy and an avid sailor. The Cressy Trophy was presented to the Naval Academy by his wife in his memory. The Cressy Trophy Regatta was originally a multi-division invitational high school regatta. The Deed of Gift was changed in 1985 to re-dedicate the Cressy Trophy as the National High School Singlehanded Championship trophy, sailed in Lasers.

Cressy 2021

The 2021 Cressy Nationals was held December 18-19 at Virginia Key Historic Park in Miami. Conditions were light to medium breeze both days with strong current ebbing from nearby Bear Cut. A total of 15 races were completed in each fleet. Congratulations to Guthrie Braun for winning the ILCA 7 Fleet and Robby Meek for winning the ILCA 6 Fleet. Conditions ranged from adequate to epic, and in all cases were better than forecast. It was never too light to sail, and the breeze briefly touched 15 kts for the college event. This event offered both charter boats and a bring-your-own-boat.



Guthrie Braun (Shorecrest Preparatory School, St Petersburg, Florida) and Robby Meek (The Severn School, Annapolis, MD) were awarded the Cressy Trophy in the Laser Standard and Laser Radial respectively.

Great Oaks Trophy

Development Regatta

The Great Oaks Invitational provides a national level regatta for developing teams, creating an opportunity to compete with peers as a team grows in numbers and skill. A system of regattas for new teams within Districts, in local leagues and District-wide, provides for development of skills and attitudes, and identifies teams ready to go forward to a national-level event. The Great Oaks was introduced into the ISSA calendar in 1999, hosted by Southern Yacht Club in New Orleans. All schools that are currently members of ISSA and have not qualified for either the Mallory or Baker in the previous four years, are eligible to enter the selection process in use in their District. A team is comprised of not fewer than two nor more than four sailors who must be full-time students in the school they represent. Each team sails one doublehanded boat.

GOLD & SILVER

Racing began at 0930 with winds from the NE at 5-8 knots, shifting in the afternoon to SE at 5. 28 teams competed in two divisions determined in the qualifying round held Saturday. 14 teams competed for top honors in Gold fleet and 14 teams competed in Silver. The day ended after 8 completed races.

Saturday: Red & Green qualifying

Races started on time at 10 AM with winds ranging from 5-11 knots from the northeast shifting more to the east during the day and increasing to 11 knots. Entries were divided into two fleets, sailing on the same course with starts about 4 minutes apart. The top 7 scorers in each of the Red and Green fleets after 10 races will move on to the Gold Fleet in Sunday's competition. The bottom 7 scorers in each fleet will move on to the Silver Fleet in Sunday's competition. There were no protests.

Districts

NESSA

NESSA had 90 teams registered for the year. The annual district meeting was held online on November 7, 2021.

The district was able to hold all of its three New England Championship this spring. The Herreshoff Trophy was sailed at New Bedford Community Boating Center. Thirty-three schools signed up for one of four qualifying regattas. St George's won the finals beating out 13 other schools.

The NESSA Team Race Championship (President's and Terk trophies) were sailed out of Connecticut College the week before the Baker. Thirty schools competed all spring to earn a berth into one of the two regattas. After an eight team double round robin with a double final four, The Hotchkiss School captured the President's Trophy and earned a berth to the Baker. St George's was second and also qualified for the Baker. Fairfield Ludlowe HS won the Terk and qualified for the NIT, along with Green Farms (4th at President's). Tabor Academy (6th at President) secured the third berth at the NIT The NIT was hosted in NESSA with 10 teams competing on Lake Massapoag in Sharon MA. Tabor Academy emphatically won the event. Green Farms Academy (2nd) Fairfield Ludlowe (6th) and host Sharon HS (10th) also attended.

The NESSA Fleet Racing Championship (O'Day Trophy) was sailed over two weekends, with qualifiers on May 1st at forty-one schools competing at four different venues. The finals were held at MIT the following weekend on a blustery but sunny day. Brunswick School captured their first O'Day trophy and qualified for the Mallory along with The Hotchkiss School and Portsmouth Abbey School. St George's School, Tabor Academy, Green Farms Academy and Barrington High School qualified for the Phebe King with St George's School and Tabor Academy's spots were filled by BC High and Milton Academy.


NESSA also recognizes the continued support of High School sailing in NESSA by community sailing centers such as SailMaine, Sail Newport, Courageous Sailing Center and New Bedford Community Sailing Center. These organizations serve as premier racing venues but also more importantly in hosting "developmenta" programming and competition. Our annual district meeting is scheduled for Nov 6, 2022

PCISA

PCISA completed a very successful season, with 91 registered teams, 5 district-wide regattas, several "specialty events" (Girls, Keelboat and Team Racing Regattas) and numerous regional events (SoCal and NorCal Regattas) and a full complement of District Championship Events. Our teams fared well this season winning the Mallory (Mater Dei HS), and taking second at Barker (Mater Dei HS), PCISA hosted the ISSA Mallory Doublehanded National Championship at Mission Bay Yacht Club.

Within the district, PCISA relies on several organizations to run events each





year. We rotate events throughout the district and use the results from 6 events to qualify teams for the Mallory Doublehanded Championship. Historically speaking, we split the season championships across the regions, with Gold in one region and Silver in another. Mission Bay Yacht Club in San Diego hosted the Gold championship and Encinal Yacht Club in Alameda hosted the Silver championship. Other regional qualifier hosts included US Sailing Center in Long Beach for Cressy, Peninsula Youth Sailing Foundation in Redwood City for Baker, St. Francis Yacht Club for Keelboat, and Mission Bay Yacht Club for the Girls Invitational. We appreciate all of the help and support that other clubs and teams provided to the hosts, especially for the Mallory Doublehanded Championship. Thank you to all the organizations, sailors, parents, and individuals that support high school sailing.

Key areas of focus for 2023 include a succession plan for the current regional leadership and fundraising to complete sail purchases for the fleet

MISSA

The Midwest District saw things start to return to normal after several seasons of COVID-related cancellations. MISSA is comprised of 122 teams in three three leagues: East (Michigan and Ohio), Central (Illinois and Indiana), and West (Minnesota and Wisconsin). MISSA venues hosted 48 regattas in the fall and 34 in the spring.

Bay High School won the fall fleet racing Great Lakes Championship, Minnetonka won the keelboat qualifier, and Walter Payton College Prep won the Girls Championship. Cressy was won by Jack Baldwin of St. Ignatius Chicago (full rig) and Jacob Zils of Minnetonka (radial).

In the spring season, Lake Forest won the MISSA Baker Qualifier and St. Ignatius of Chicago won the MISSA Mallory and was the overall top ranked team for the year.

SAISA

SAISA had another successful year with 95 active dues paying member schools. Cressy was held in September and saw 52 boats attend at SPYC. The Keelboat Championship was once again hosted at SPYC with 10 teams competing and Lake Travis High School winning that event. Our north and south points ended in mid March with our district championship held at Eckerd College the first weekend of April. SAISA Girls Champs was held at Jacksonville University with local team Bishop Kenny won led by Bridget Monahan. SAISA's own Guthrie Braun won Cressy Nationals ILCA 7 from Shorecrest prep and Jackson McAliley from Ransom Everglades and Jack Redmond from St. Thomoas Aquinas finished 2nd and 3rd respectively in the ILCA 6 division. Immaculata La Salle High School won the Baker Nationals led by Mitchell and Justin Callahan and Umi Noritake.

SEISA

Many thanks to all of our schools, coaches, parents, volunteers, and hosts for an outstanding 2021 2022 year! SEISA saw an uptick in membership with now 30 schools in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, the panhandle of Florida, and even a new school from Colorado. SEISA has East and West leagues with league leadership taken from the district board of directors. The district competed in at least 36 regattas. Of particular note: SEISA hosted the Baker Nationals, the Great Oaks National Invitational, the SEISA Championships, the Mississippi State Championships, and Texas State Championships.

A huge thank you to Lakewood Yacht Club for hosting the Baker Team Racing Championship. A big thank you too to all the judges and organizers that worked so hard to make the event a success. Thanks also to Austin Yacht Club who lent boats and assistance for the Baker.

The New Orleans area was very active hosting such regattas as the NOYC Girls Regatta, Great Oaks Invitational, Sugar Bowl Regatta, and the NOYC Fall Series and Spring Series. Ponchartrain Yacht Club again did an outstanding job supporting high school sailing with such regattas as the Back to School Regatta and the Northshore Cup. The Mississippi area hosted the Hospitality Regatta, the Mississippi Fleet and Team Racing Championships, Monk Smith Regatta, the Halloween Regatta, and Rock the New Year Regatta. Texas has been very active hosting such regattas as the Lakewood Winter Fling, Lake Travis Fall Classic, and of course the Baker.

Congratulations to Lake Travis High School for winning the ISSA Keelboat Invitational! We look forward to continued success amongst our teams and the district.

MASSA

MASSA was proud to have 141 active teams during the 2021-2022 school year, which saw the return of the full sailing schedule post-pandemic. The district continues to operate with five leagues, all of which have been successful at hosting their own open and qualifying events.

The Fall 2021 season saw MASSA host the Cressy District Qualifier at the American Yacht Club in Rye, New York. Forty-six sailors attended the event (30 ILCA 6, 16 ILCA 7) with the top-three advancing to the Cressy Nationals in December. MASSA was proud to have the Cressy National ILCA 6 Champion, Robbie Meek '23 (Severn School, MDISA).

MASSA's Fall 2021 Fleet Race Championship was hosted by Rochester Yacht Club and the top six schools advanced to the Atlantic Coast Championship (Severn School, Christchurch School, Christian Brothers, Stony Brook, Norfolk Collegiate, Norfolk Academy). The Fall Team Race Championship was held at St. Mary's College of Maryland, where Severn School emerged victorious.

The MASSA Keelboat Qualifier was hosted by Annapolis YC, where Christchurch and Broadneck earned berths to the Keelboat National Invitational. The Atlantic Coast Championship was hosted by Old Dominion University in November, featuring teams from four districts, and Severn School once again topped the fleet.

The MASSA 2022 Baker District Qualifier was hosted by the Navy Academy in late April, where Severn and Christchurch finished first and second and advanced to the Baker Nationals in Texas. Third and fourth place, Norfolk Academy and Norfolk Collegiate, advanced to the NIT regatta in Massachusetts. MASSA's Girls Championship was unfortunately canceled due to an early May nor'easter in Annapolis.

The Christchurch School hosted the MASSA 2022 Mallory District Qualifier, seeing Severn, Christchurch, Stony Brook, and Norfolk Collegiate advancing to the Mallory Nationals in San Diego. The next five teams qualified for the Phebe King Memorial Trophy National Invitational, which was hosted by MASSA at Youth Sailing Virginia. Severn was the runner-up at the Mallory Nationals.

MASSA leadership in 2021-2022 included: District Director Dr. Randall Nunn, District 2nd Representative Jason Lutz, ISSA at-large representative Jane Millman, and league directors Joan Patterson (VISA), Liam Faudree (NYISA-NW), John Everitt (NYISA-SE), Josh Morrison (MDISA), and Dr. Randall Nunn (NJISA).

MASSA looks forward to hosting the 2023 Mallory National Championship at Toms River Yacht Club in 2023.
